This theme is a constant reminder to all of us that together everyone achieves more. It also reminds us of the unity that Christ called us to in His final prayer before ascending to the Father.



Juvenile Justice is better with you. You've helped us expand this year! For the first time ever, Juvenile Justice Ministry will be in a facility in Omaha.

Nebraska Correctional Youth Facility in Omaha houses about 60 kids each night. These teens are held in the juvenile prison for an average of 18 months. For years, there has not been an outside chaplain present at the juvenile prison. This, in part, is due to the excessive regulations and rules the state has put in place, but finally, together, we are starting a program similar to what we do in the county jail here in Lincoln.

Thankfully, we have the perfect staff member for the job! Kyle Lindgren has served on our Parent Life staff for a number of years but recently found his heart pulled toward kids in jail. Starting the beginning of September, Kyle began the five-week process of completing the Department of Corrections new staff training so that he could begin serving as a chaplain in Omaha.

While he begins this new venture at the juvenile prison in Omaha, Eldon Dietrich and Nathan Kroll continue to faithfully serve students at the Lancaster County youth detention center. Each night 40 teens spend the night in jail right here in Lincoln.

Over the summer we offered an intensive life skills course for kids in the detention center. Beth TeKolste, Seth Roepke, and Kyle Lindgren were inside the Lancaster County detention center three days a week for five weeks teaching students the life skills they need to succeed. The relationships they built during those five weeks were significant and impactful on the teens.

We continue to offer tours of the detention center every other month over the lunch hour. If you have any interest in finding out more about getting involved with JJM, we'd love to invite you to our next See the Story luncheon; give us a call (402-420-7475) and we will let you know when it is.



Not Good Enough

That Was Victory

At our last "See the Story" luncheon, our JJM chaplain, Eldon Dietrich, shared about Sandy, a girl who told him,

"I don't feel like I'm good enough to read the Bible."

At 15 years of age, Sandy has a meth problem, which landed her in jail. The heaviness of her choices and the lies of Satan were telling her she's not good enough to even read about Jesus, the One who came to rescue her. Eldon was encouraged a few days later when Sandy asked to meet with a JJM mentor. This summer we taught a five-week class in the detention center discussing important life skills. Topics ranged from goal setting, to stress, to family and all other relationships to love languages, to trust and forgiveness to employment readiness and even making homemade ice cream! That's something a lot of these kids have never done. During the first two weeks, the students were very cold, but by week three some students were opening up and definitely showed they wanted to hear what we had to say. That was a victory!

We had a girl this summer at the detention center who was an avid reader. Her name was Mikala. Because of her love for reading, I offered her "70 x 7 and Beyond" by Monty Christensen. It's a life story about love, pain, and forgiveness, published by Prison Ministries. Mikala read it and said it was the best book she had ever read. She said she could totally relate to the author's meth addiction, but didn't understand where he got the faith. Mikala asked if she could have a JJM mentor. She had already had a different mentor for a few years, and when I asked about that mentor she said she wanted a Christian mentor!

Mikala's intrigue was piqued. I connected her with Kristi, a JJM mentor who's volunteered with us for a few years. Mikala and Kristi are still connecting even though Mikala is now out of the detention center and has transitioned to an academy in Omaha. We just heard from a staff member at the group home how much Mikala likes her mentor, Kristi.

Mikala celebrated her 14th birthday in the detention center in Lincoln. We play cards together; she is just a joy to be around.

Shortly after she was transferred to the academy in Omaha, Mikala got in trouble there. I visited and she was angry and hardened. But she's been there for three months now, and I visit and she's glowing, saying hi to everyone and doing very well there. Mikala is coming to believe in herself. She loves books and devotions; she'll gobble up anything I bring. She shared with me a quote she found: "Take care of others, but don't leave yourself behind." This was monumental for her, understanding she should have pride in caring for herself, understanding that healthy confidence in herself is good. Mikala has told me her mom always says she's praying for her. Before I end my visit every time Mikala asks, "Will you pray for us?" Most of the girls don't ask for prayer. It's such a joy to watch God changing Mikala one day at a time.

I asked Shawn where he heard that stuff; he said that he'd never gone to church, that all that stuff he has learned while being locked up! What a testimony to the purpose chaplains serve. I then challenged Shawn's rap skills, asking him to read Isaiah 53 and write me a rap about what he thought it was saying. He gladly accepted the challenge.

Annie's knowledge and social work skills add a lot to our Parent Life team as well. Her passion to connect with teens shines through very strongly. You can often see her toting her own two kids along as she meets teen parents across the city.

In addition to Tiffany and Annie, Lenore Berger, on Campus Life staff, has stepped up to help out with Parent Life. We are better together. Between the three of them, they help teach parenting classes in four LPS high schools. These classes give our Parent Life staff a great opportunity to connect with pregnant and parenting teens in our community.

The Tuesday night Parent Life program continues to meet at Calvary Community Church at Superior and First streets. For each of those Tuesday night programs, a small group or individual prepares and serves a meal to the teen families; that same group or another volunteer group provides child care. We are better together. The service from volunteers allows our Parent Life staff and volunteers to invest deeply in the lives of these teen parents and their young children.

These past few weeks in Parent Life, I've been humbled and surprised by a particular person who has been showing up and stepping out. It is a teen father who comes to Parent Life. He comes because he only gets to see his daughter on Tuesday nights. Jake normally shows up on Tuesday nights disengaged with his earphones in, but last week, I was able to connect with him on a deeper level. Jake participated in our prayer time and we celebrated his birthday. Opening up to me, Jake explained that his family struggles with poverty. He took the birthday cake and meal that was served at Parent Life home with him because he wasn't sure his family had food for the night. Jake also confided about how tough it is being a teen dad, not being able to see his daughter, and having family dynamics that complicate everything even further. He also told me how thankful he was for the birthday recognition. I'm excited to see what God is going to do in Jake's life.

Hannah has begun coaching sports at Lux Middle School with the hopes of connecting with more and more students. Each Thursday morning, as many as 115 kids have attended Campus Life at Lux to have fun and engage with the person of Jesus Christ.

Beth TeKolste continues to lead the charge at Norris High School. Her longtime connections to that school have proven invaluable to the redevelopment of that ministry.

This year, we've been proud to add Kaleb Andersen and Jarvis Green to our Campus Life team. Kaleb has jumped right in at Pound Middle School, and Jarvis is investing in kids at Northeast High School and Culler Middle School. We are better together.

Baptized at Camp



Riley doesn't feel like anyone has ever loved her because her parents have told her as much many times. After surviving a suicide attempt, Riley came to camp just to get away.

Throughout the week at camp, God was speaking to Riley and showing her how much He loved her. You could see the emotions - anger, fear, sadness, hope, distrust, desire - moving across her face. This girl is working through a lot. Toward the end of the week, Riley said she knows God has kept her alive and she thinks He loves her. Riley is so close to understanding! We connected her with a youth leader who will continue walking this road of faith recovery with Riley as she goes home from camp.

"This kid didn't want to talk to anybody else because he didn't trust anybody else, but he trusted Seth. And that was totally fine with me because I know Seth and trust Seth and believe in what Campus Life is





First Day



It was my first day working at Culler Middle School as a para-educator. Around 1:00 p.m., I went to the room I thought I was assigned to (God orchestrates all things), and I saw that a student was becoming very upset. He definitely did not want to be where he

was. I was told my correct room assignment, got settled in my room, and a bit later the upset boy was in my doorway. He had come to my room to calm down.

Through conversation, I found out that his name was Owen, his close uncle had just committed suicide, and his mother was not going to let him go to his funeral. Owen and his mother got into a big argument. He was still very upset at school. We discussed how society says men are not supposed to cry. Owen told me his grandfather had slapped him because he was crying at his father's funeral. I told him that it's alright to cry. I told him how my father passed away my senior year of high school, and I too didn't want to cry, but it took a special family member to touch my shoulder for me to let it all go. Owen brought up God so I told him I was a youth pastor at my church and that he was more than welcome to come to ours or any other church in the area. I love these moments when I can plant seeds of God's love in those who feel lost and alone.

Dylan Coming Regularly to Church

Dylan's been around Campus Life for a while. He started coming to Campus Life in middle school, and he was an "Eddie Haskell" type of kid. When he got to high school, Dylan kept coming to Campus Life to hang out with his friends and to be around girls. He was a respectful kid, but he was not focused at all on Christ. Dylan was Jewish.

I invited Dylan to come to church with me a year ago. Dylan has been coming regularly to Elevate Church since. This past summer, Dylan went with the youth group on a missions trip to Salem, Oregon. They did outreach there. Before the trip, Dylan stated that he was willing to give Jesus a chance to reveal Himself on the trip, as well as in his life. During the trip, Dylan sensed that God was calling him into a deeper relationship with Him. Dylan is even more involved with Campus Life now, so much so that we have even discussed the possibility of him participating in our YFC Leadership Academy internship after he graduates.

Rachel's been living in a group home. Rachel's step-dad wanted her to branch out and get involved, so in 8th grade Rachel started coming to Campus Life at Lincoln High. She was extremely shy and hesitant about the whole thing, but now, three years later, Rachel is very involved in Campus Life. She attends everything we do, joins us at LHS sporting events, and texts me often. She has come alive seeing what a relationship with Christ is supposed to look like.

Rachel grew up in a very rule-based environment with God's name put on it. God's grace was not in the equation. Having watched myself and the other Campus Life staff live out our relationships with Jesus for years now, she told me, "This makes a lot more sense." Rachel has recently come out that she thinks she's bisexual. Still we have welcomed her with open arms at Campus Life and initiated the discussion on what the Bible has to say about all that. God loves Rachel. We are seeking to love her back to Christ, not push her away from Christ.

For years God has used trips and camp experiences to draw students to His side.

Gary Schulte, our executive director in the mid 1970s and 1980s, remembers taking kids to Worlds of Fun in 1973, the same year that the park opened. Forty-four years later we still take students to Worlds of Fun! Why? Because when you can get a kid out of their normal routine and spend an entire day with them you can have deep conversations getting to know a kid and opening the door to share Christ with him/her.

For over 40 years, we have also been taking kids to summer camp at Quaker Ridge near Colorado Springs. Of course, there have been years we weren't able to take kids because of finances or staffing, but when we do, God throws open the hearts of kids.

Some trips, like Worlds of Fun and our all-nighters, are primarily relationship building times where as others, like Camp, Red Weekend, and Winter Retreat, are primarily geared at being spiritual growth / Gospel-sharing trips.

These next few stories of kids' lives being changed for Christ all happened on a trip or at camp this summer.

She Wasn't Interested in Jesus

7 Out of 9!

"No." She wasn't interested in accepting Jesus. Rachel is a pretty straightforward kind of gal. Her honesty and spunk are contagious. Mid-week at the high school's YFCamp this summer, a conversation around what it means to believe in Jesus and trust Him as Savior was going on during the girls' cabin time, and Rachel was completely honest. She did not want to accept Jesus. But all through the week and during every cabin time, Rachel was very engaged in the conversation and asked excellent questions.

Rachel has gone to Campus Life since she was a 6th grader so she's heard the Gospel multiple times. Now in high school at summer camp, her questions, pondering, and confirmations were growing. On the last night of camp, Rachel told me,

"I'm so close to saying yes [to Jesus]."

I was thrilled! We're eager to see how Jesus will continue working in Rachel's heart as He draws her step-by-step closer to Himself. Rachel was so excited for Campus Life to start up for the fall semester.


From Foster Care to Camp

Eventually on "mess night" (i.e. "All have sinned and fall short of the glory of God"), Kyle opened up to our cabin. He shared that he feels no one at his home cares. He needed the guys at camp, the brotherhood that was forming. The next night, "response night" when students are asked to spend time alone with God, Kyle accepted Jesus into his life. During the time the students were alone with God, it rained really really hard and some of the cabins were flooded, including ours. All of Kyle's clothes and such had been left out on the floor. Everything was soaked. Immediately all the guys in the cabin offered to loan their clothes to Kyle, or whatever else he needed. It was really cool

to see their response; a "we take care of each other" mentality had formed. The last day of camp, we got up at the crack of dawn to hike Soldier Mountain. Seeing the view from the top, Kyle said, "This is how I know God is real." It was breathtaking, the view from the mountain and the brotherhood that did form that week, centered on Christ.


